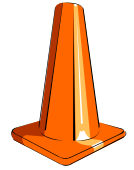


Rally Round Up

Most recently, her Belgian Sheepdog, Katie, began her Rally career by tying for 1st place for her first two Novice legs earning 99 points each day. She completed her Rally Excellent title earning three 1st places and a 3rd place. Victoria's students have been exceptionally successful in Rally competition, earning multiple placements and numerous scores in the upper 90s.
